Lavigne declared quorum to have been achieved.

## 2. RATIFICATION OF PLENARY SPEAKER

Lavigne said that the National Executive was recommending that Guy Caron be ratified as plenary speaker. He noted that Caron had been National Chairperson of the Federation, 1994-96, and was experienced at chairing plenary sessions.

Caron welcomed the delegates to the meeting. He said that delegates should approach both members of the National Executive and Federation staff with questions. He reviewed the various points in Robert's Rules.

## 3. ANNOUNCMENT OF PROXIES

Caron announced that:

## 5. ADOPTION OF GENERAL MEETING BLOCK AGENDA

Caron said that in addition to the positions which would be elected at the meeting, the Students' of Colour National Executive Representative would also be elected. He said that the Constituency Group Commission

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would meet during dinner on Saturday, May 23. He said that closing plenary on Saturday, May 23 would start at 14:00 and the workshop would be presented in the morning of Sunday, May 24.

Lavigne said that the National Executive had invited both Weng Dan, a leader in the Tianammen Square uprising, and Wei Jingsheng, a Chinese activist, to speak at the general meeting. He said that Weng Dan was unable to attend the general meeting because he had a previous commitment in California. He said that the National Executive had also invited the leader of the Bejing Spring movement, Wei Jingsheng. He said that Jingsheng accepted the invitation and is excited about presenting an analysis on the movement for democracy in China from the student perspective. He said that Mr. Wei has recently been released from prison after ninteen years. He said that the reason that the National Executive is recommending that the agenda be altered is to accommodate Mr Wei's schedule.

## 6. RATIFICATION OF DE-FEDERATION REFERENDA

## a. Local 14-McMaster Students' Union

National Chairperson Lavigne reported that the members of the McMaster Students' Union voted, in a referendum held February 3-4, 1998, against continued membership in the Federation. He said that 1,632 students voted in favour of continued membership while 1,930 had voted against it.

## 7. CONSIDERATION OF APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP

## a. Local 92-Student Association of George Brown College

National Chairperson Lavigne reported that, from March to April 3, 1998, the members of the Student Association of George Brown College had voted in a referendum on full membership in the Federation. He said that 680 – 70 percent – of the 995 Association members who voted had supported Federation membership. He said that the National Executive had reviewed the referendum results and was recommending that membership in the Federation be ratified.

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## b. Local 91-Concordia Students' Union

National Chairperson Lavigne reported that, on March 24-27, 1998, the members of the Concordia Students' Union had voted in a referendum on full membership in the Federation. He said that 595 – 55 percent — of the 1,087 members who voted had supported membership. He said that the National Executive had reviewed the referendum results and was recommending that membership in the Federation be ratified. He noted that no application for membership had been received yet, because the Union was waiting for completion of its referendum appeals process before submitting it. He said that, nevertheless, membership should ratified immediately, but that it should be made conditional upon receipt of the application.

Lavigne said that the community college system in Newfoundland and Labrador has been amalgamated into one system and therefore a number of the students associations have merged into one association. He said that the Central Newfoundland Regional College Student Association is a full member of the Federation. He said that structural changes in the Association will be recognised and the newly formed College of the North Atlantic Student Association will be recognised as Local 87.

Whereas the student association at Westviking College applied for and was granted prospective membership in the Federation by the May 1995 national general meeting; and

Whereas the student associations at Central Newfoundland Regional College and Eastern College applied for and were granted prospective membership in the Federation by the November 1995 national general meeting; and

Whereas in April 1996 the members of the Central Newfoundland Regional College Students' Association voted overwhelmingly (502 in favour and 9 opposed) to apply for full membership in the Federation; and

Whereas the members of the Central Newfoundland Regional College Students' Association were granted full membership in the Federation by the May 1996 national general meeting and designated as Local 87 of the Federation; and

Whereas the student associations at Cabot College and Labrador Community College applied for and were granted prospective membership in the Federation by the November 1996 national general meeting; and

Whereas in 1997 Cabot College, Central Newfoundland Regional College, Eastern College, Labrador Community College and Westviking College were amalgamated by the Newfoundland and Labrador provincial government to form the College of the Nortt Atlantic; and

Whereas the student associations at the former colleges were subsequently amalgamated into one association, the College of the Northe Atlantic Students' Association; and

Whereas the new Association is composed exclusively of members who were either full members of the Federation or who belonged to prospective member locals of the Federation; and

Whereas the Association is legally and ethically responsible for fulfilling the full and prospective membership obligations of the former student associations which it replaced; and

Whereas the full members of the Federation, who formerly belonged to the Central Newfoundland Regional College Students' Association, retain their status and rights as full members of the Federation; therefore

Be it resolved that the College of the North Atlantic Student Association be recognised as Local 87.

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Local 87delegate Ken Byrne said that there are eighteen campuses of the College of the North Atlantic and the Central Newfoundland Regional College only accounts for three of those campuses. He said that the Student Association has decided to revoke its membership and he has been charged with the responsibility of attending the general meeting and reporting his impressions to members of the Students' Association.

Lavigne said that the Federation is recognising that the regional college campuses have amalgamated and that the Central Newfoundland Regional College has a different name. He said that students at the campuses, which formerly composed Central Newfoundland Regional College, are still members of the Federation despite the amalgamation.

Local 87delegate Ken Byrne said that the College of the North Atlantic includes all of the eighteen campuses. He said that the problem is that some students are full members of the Federation and some are not, which makes it inconsistent.

## 9. PRESENTATION BY STAFF RELATIONS OFFICER

Story said that her role as Staff Relations Officer is to act as the contact person in dealing with the staff on a formal level. She said that the employees of the Federation are unionised with the Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 1281. She said that the collective agreement gives staff full participation rights at all meetings of the Federation. She said that employees have speaking rights and it is important to recognise that staff plays an important role in the achievement of the goals and directions that are established at the meetings. She said that staff is a resource during the establishment of those goals and in the fulfilment of the goals. She said that delegates should respect this relationship. She said that any concerns or questions should be addressed to her or to another member of the National Executive.

At this point, Story introduced the staff.

## 10. INTRODUCTION OF HARASSMENT ADVISORS

Tara Connolly introduced herself and Florence Loh. She said that the harassment advisors' job is to facilitate the delegates' work during the meetings. She said that many people can assist delegates in their work but the advisors are there to assist them if they encounter a situation that will impede their ability to participate fully in the meeting. She encouraged delegates to review the harassment procedure in the policy manual. She said that the Federation has the policy in an attempt to highlight that demeaning or abusive behaviour is inappropriate. She said that if delegates wish to approach the advisors on an informal level to vent or to seek advice they are welcome to. She said that delegated should not be afraid of conflict, she said that handled responsibly it can be a catalyst for change. She said that the difference between constructive and unconstructive conflict is the manner in which it is handled. She said that non-verbal communication is strong and people often react to it first. She said that it is also important to recognise that some delegates are not speaking in their first language and to be cognisant of this. She said that the personal and the political are intertwined.

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## 11. PRESENTATION FROM THE \*TRANSGENDERED, LESBIAN, GAY AND BISEXUAL STUDENTS' CONSTITUENCY GROUP

Be it resolved that item 11. Presentation from the \*Transgendered, Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Constituency Group be postponed to closing plenary.

## 12. PRESENTATION OF THE REPORT OF THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE

Caron said that the May 1998 National Executive report would be presented during closing plenary because it was in translation. He said that the English version of the report would be available by Thursday, May 21. He said that the November 1997 National Executive report was not considered at the previous national general meeting and delegates should review it at this time. He said that the report was mailed to delegates immediately following the 1997 November general meeting.

Local 19 delegate Holly Baines said that the report contains information which is relevant to the debates and the National Executive should endeavour to ensure that it is available to the membership before the consideration of issues.

Local 18 delegate Jaimie McEvoy said that, if the report cannot be produced for the membership on a timely basis, it is redundant. He said that the National Executive should provide an oral report in an effort to help guide some of the discussions to be held at the national general meeting.

Be it resolved that the November 1997 National Executive report be received.

Local 18 delegate McEvoy asked for more information regarding the National Action Committee on the Status of Women (NAC) campaigns and the decisions undertaken by the NAC in which the Federation is involved. He said that he was interested in more information regarding the international student visas and the state of the International Union of Students (International Union of Students).

Women's Representative Darcie Davidson said that the campaigns on which the NAC has focussed include fighting against the Multi-lateral Agreement on Investment (MAI), the Asia-Pacific Economic Congress (APEC) and globalisation. She said that the Federation is participating in a panel discussion on globalisation and feminism. She said that the NAC sponsored a Women's Conference on APEC.

Story said that in the previous federal budget the funding for women's programme initiatives was changed from an allowance for core funding to a project funding formula. She said that many women's organisations that received multi-year funding and basic funding are now required to continually apply for funding and justifying the work they are undertaking. She said that the Federation participated in a meeting with the NAC to lobby federal Minister Heddy Fry on this issue.

Carlyle said that Story and she have been working with the International Union of Students (IUS). She said that the Federation has continued to work within the Union to organise a national congress, although a location has not yet been selected. She said that this is the main focus with respect to the rebuilding of the IUS. She said that the President of the IUS was planning to attend the national general meeting but was unable to do so.

Story said that the Students' of Colour Representative was responsible for the directive regarding visas for international students. She said that the representative has not attended a number of National Executive meetings and the directive has not yet been reassigned.

Local 44 Anita delegate Zaenker said that the two Nigerian students who approached the Federation for assistance and were referred to the World University Services of Canada are now being hosted by Local 44. She asked how the information on the web site is being maintained and which National Executive member is responsible for it.

Lavigne said that the web site is managed on a daily basis by the Communications Coordinator and is updated frequently. He said that a person on contract undertakes certain aspects of the work.

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Local 11 delegate Penny McCall-Howard said that she is concerned regarding the Federation's lack of response to the changes to the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act. She asked what the action was taken.

Lavigne said that Bill C-5 which enacted the legislation took effect in the fall 1997. He said that it was introduced as law in 1995. He said that the lack of visible action was due to the long delay between the introduction of the legislation and the enactment of it. He said that the Federation has been very vocal in opposition to the changes to the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act. He said that Federation representatives addressed this issue extensively and provided analysis during the Standing Committee on Finance.

Local 54 delegate Amanda Dorter asked about the status of Travel CUTS. She said that she has concerns relating to the expansion of Travel CUTS into the United States. She said that it appears that the Federation is losing control of the company through this expansion. She said that information on these issues should have been included in the National Executive report.

Graduate Representative Michael Temelini said that the decision to expand into the United States will be debated during the general meeting in the sub-committees. He said that many of the issues regarding Travel CUTS expansion into the United States will be addressed in the May 1998 National Executive report. He said that some of the questions will be answered at that time and any further questions could be answered during the closing plenary.

Story said that the Standing Resolutions dictate that the Travel CUTS finances be reported upon in the National Executive report. She said that she agreed that it does not preclude the inclusion of more information.

Local 8 delegate Margaret Bryans asked why the membership did not debate the expansion of Travel CUTS into the United States before it occurred.

Story said that the decision to open two offices in California was made upon advice from the travel company. She said that it will be explained in more detail in committees; however, with increased globalisation and the open skies aspect of North American Free Trade Agreement, it is becoming increasingly more difficult to negotiate student fares with the airlines. She said that other student travel companies were expressing their intention to open stores in Canada. She said that plenary has never debated the opening of Travel CUTS offices in the past, including the opening of the Travel CUTS offices in the United Kingdom.

Newfoundland and Labrador Chairperson Dale Kirby said that the plenary has never debated the actual business of Travel CUTS. He said that it is the responsibility of the Travel CUTS representatives.

Saskatchewan Component representative Jessica Peart said that it is important for the members to debate the issue because the travel company is an integral part of the Federation.

## 13. ACCEPTANCE OF RESIGNATION OF TRAVEL CUTS BOARD MEMBER

Local 54 delegate Amanda Dorter read a letter of resignation on behalf of Travel CUTS Board member Kim Radbourne. She summarised by saying that Radbourne believes that owning a travel agency is in complete conflict with the work of the Federation. She said that owning a competitive company within a global, capitalist economy means that the Federation's interests could never be ranked. She said that the Federation needs to re-evaluate these issues.

Be it resolved that the resignation of at-Large Travel CUTS Board member Kim Radbourne be accepted.

Caron said that plenary would be debating the acceptance or rejection of the resignation only.

Local 18 delegate Jaimie McEvoy said that the resignation letter included comments which delegates should be entitled to debate. He said that a position was presented to the membership without allowing them to debate it and to respond to it. He said that the letter circumvented the procedure for accountability in the Federation. He asked if the letter reflected the opinions of the other representatives on the Travel CUTS Board and if their response could be made available. He said that all members have the same standing in the Federation and one person's opinion should not unduly alter the decisions of plenary.

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Local 44 delegate Rob Fleming said that he was in favour of accepting the letter of resignation. He said that the future of Travel CUTS is a separate issue. He said that it is clear that the individual wishes to resign so it would be ridiculous to reject the resignation.

Local 79/Local 83

Be it resolved that Motion 98/05:013 be postponed until the closing plenary.

A delegate from Local 79 said that it was an important issue and delegates should have an opportunity to reflect on it. He said that Radbourne may not wish to resign depending on the outcome of the debates in committees and the plenary.

## 98/05:014 WITHDRAWN

A delegate asked if the position would be filled at the national general meeting.

Temelini said that as per Robert's Rules of Order and the Federation's bylaws, the by-election would occur at the November 1998 national general meeting and the National Executive would appoint an individual for the remainder of Radbourne's term.

Caron said that if the vacancy had occurred before the general meeting a by-election would have been initiated.

Local 86 delegate Diane Davis said that the resignation should be accepted. She said that it was a mistake to allow the letter to be read and delegates lost their democratic voice because they were not allowed to debate the arguments in the letter.

At this point the Local 71 delegation formally challenged the ruling of the Plenary Speaker that a by-election could not be held for the vacancy on the Travel CUTS Board created by the resignation of Kim Radbourne.

Local 18/Local 75

Be it resolved that the decision of the Plenary Speaker be sustained.

Caron said that he interpreted the Bylaws to read that in the case of a resignation at a national general meeting the National Executive must appoint another member of the National Executive to sit on the Travel CUTS Board until the following national general meeting. He said that the situation would be different if the resignation had been received before the national general meeting. He said that the elections for the National Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson, Treasurer and Travel CUTS board member are preceded by notice of election. He said that this is to assist members to prepare for the elections. He said that a vacancy has never occurred on the National Executive at a national general meeting. He said that the elections are a very serious process and the members should have an opportunity to consider it.

A delegate from Local 71 said that a vacancy at a national general meeting should be treated differently than a vacancy occurring between national general meetings. She said that it seems more democratic for the membership to elect a member of the Travel CUTS board.

## Private Donations and the Funding of Research and Artistic Endeavours

The Federation opposes the use of donations as a replacement for public funding. We believe that the federal government should bear primary responsibility for research and artistic endeavours at post-secondary institutions. Private donations should serve to augment public support for research.

The Federation believes that the pursuit of basic research is the primary purpose of university-based research. It is critical to ensure that there is not public subsidy of private interests. Furthermore we call on both levels of government to ensure that there is an equitable and sufficient distribution of funding between disciplines and institutions.

The Federation believes that research conducted through public institutions should be open and transparent, meaning that:

- funding sources are known;
- areas of investigation are known; and,
- results are publicly accessible institutions have an obligation to refuse money from despicable sources and therefore we support binding protocols for the acceptance of donations. These protocols must:
- be democratically determined at the local level by members of the community served by the institution;
- ensure that private interests do not exercise influence over the academic priorities of the institution;
- protect those at the institution from corporate exploitation;
- include a regularly updated list of institutional needs to help provide priorities to donors.

The Federation opposes weapons-directed research and calls for a ban on such research.

## Assessment of Student Need

The Federation believes an accessible education system is one which is open to all applicants who desire to attend a post-secondary institution. An accessible education should allow the individual student to choose the education of her choice. In addition, the Federation supports the elimination of all financial barriers to post-secondary education (refer to Issues Policy: Accessibility). Post-secondary institutions levy up-front user fees to subsidise operating costs. The Federation fervently opposes any proposals which advocate for tuition fees as a solution to the problem of under-funding. Systemic under-funding has increased the financial burden sustained by students in post-secondary institutions through up-front user fees.

The Federation believes that the government must consider the realistic costs of post-secondary education above and beyond tuition fees and ancillary fees. Furthermore, the Federation believes that student aid line item levels should be adjusted annually to reflect the costs associated with the attainment of a post-secondary education, and that this adjustment should reflect regional differences in the cost of obtaining a post-secondary education (refer to Issues Policy: Student Aid).

Need is defined as circumstances requiring some course of action in times of difficulty or crisis, often described as destitution or poverty in extreme circumstances. The Federation recognises there are varying financial

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requirements between students pursuing studies in colleges/technical institutes, undergraduate programs, and graduate programs. The Federation also recognises the unique financial needs of students with disabilities and international students. Therefore the Federation recognises that it is essential to identify various parameters in determining the financial needs of these different groups.

The following criteria should be included in any assessment of need:

### Living Expenses:

- rent/mortgage
- car/transportation
- monthly bills
- food/household/hygiene
- trips home
- clothing
- moving costs

# Post-secondary Education:

- up-front user fees (tuition, ancillary, etc.)
- books/program supplies/equipment
- currently held scholarships, stipends, research granting council funding

#### Research:

- travel/conferences
- publishing
- thesis production costs
- academic subscriptions

#### Employment:

- full-time versus part-time
- income
- assets

### Debt:

- previous student loans
- line of credit
- credit cards

#### Other:

- disability
- age/mature status/grad
- dependants

Whereas the student association at Westviking College applied for and was granted prospective membership in the Federation by the May 1995 national general meeting; and

Whereas the student associations at Central Newfoundland Regional College and Eastern College applied for and were granted prospective membership in the Federation by the November 1995 national general meeting; and

Whereas in April 1996 the members of the Central Newfoundland Regional College Students' Association voted overwhelmingly (502 in favour and 9 opposed) to apply for full membership in the Federation; and

Whereas the members of the Central Newfoundland Regional College Students' Association were granted full membership in the Federation by the May 1996 national general meeting and designated as Local 87 of the Federation; and

Whereas the student associations at Cabot College and Labrador Community College applied for and were granted prospective membership in the Federation by the November 1996 national general meeting; and

Whereas in 1997 Cabot College, Central Newfoundland Regional College, Eastern College, Labrador Community College and Westviking College were amalgamated by the Newfoundland and Labrador provincial government to form the College of the North Atlantic; and

Whereas the student associations at the former colleges were subsequently amalgamated into one association, the College of the North Atlantic Students' Association; and

Whereas the new Association is composed exclusively of members who were either full members of the Federation or who belonged to prospective member locals of the Federation; and

Whereas the Association is legally and ethically responsible for fulfilling the full and prospective membership obligations of the former student associations which it replaced; and

Whereas the full members of the Federation, who formerly belonged to the Central Newfoundland Regional College Students' Association, retain their status and rights as full members of the Federation; therefore

Be it resolved that the College of the North Atlantic Student Association be recognised as Local 87.

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National Chairperson Lavigne said that, as a result of negotiations with representatives from the College of the North Atlantic Students' Association, the National Executive was recommending that Motion 98/05:006 be withdrawn.

### b. Consideration of Applications for Prospective Membership Extensions

Ontario Representative Heidi Van Dyk said that the prospective membership of the Haileybury Northern School of Mines Students' Association has been extended once before. She said that there are a few reasons that the full membership referendum has not been held. She said that the school has a number of co-op programs so the leadership of the Association is only in the school for a few months and then absent working on co-op terms. She said that the administration has been difficult regarding the collection of fees. She said that both the Northern-Eastern Fieldworker and the Northern Ontario board representative have been involved in negotiations with the student association in an attempt to initiate a referendum.

# 3. PRESENTATION OF THE MAY 1998 REPORT OF THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE

## a. Receipt of the Report

## **Campaigns and Government Relations**

National Chairperson Lavigne said that the National Executive was pleased to submit its report which includes the activities of the Federation over the previous six months. He said that the greatest amount of time and effort was devoted to the National Day of Action. He said that the National Day of Action was a tremendous success on a variety of different levels. He said that the level of participation was as good or better than on previous days of action. He said that the Day of Action is not an independent campaign but a tactic within an ongoing campaign to reduce student debt, to persuade the Federal government to abandon income contingent student loans schemes, to stop Federal funding cuts and to freeze tuition and other user fees. He said that a week and a half following the Day of Action the Federal government announced for the second time that income contingent student loan repayment schemes were no longer a priority and the Federal government was abandoning the policy at the federally. He said that the fight must be maintained. He said that the only provincial government that supports the scheme is Ontario.

Lavigne said that the campaign to increase funding for the research granting councils was successful in that the Federation was successful in working with coalition partners within the research section for an increase in the funding to the granting councils. He said that according to the federal budget the funding levels would be restored to 1995 levels. He said that although the membership had stronger demands it is positive that the cuts to funding were ceased and that new money is being injected. He said that although the National Executive report is not the most appropriate place for an exhaustive analysis of the budget some analysis of the Federal budget is included in the report. He said that the Federal government's trend in funding individuals versus the entire system and how it is eroding universality and quality is addressed in the National Executive report.

Lavigne said that a campaign addressing the merger of the Royal Bank and the Bank of Montreal and the Toronto Dominion and the Canadian Imperial Bank was initiated following the announcement in January. He said that the Federation was quick to respond to this situation.

Lavigne said that 400 000 students were looking for work last summer, representing 17% youth unemployment rates. He said that these are unacceptably high levels of youth unemployment and the government is contributing less to programs then when they were introduced in 1985.

Lavigne said that the Day against Hate occurred in March and is included in the report. He said that there are a number of other projects which are included in the report but are not as significant due to the effort and resources devoted to the campaign against student debt and the National Day of Action.

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#### Internal Issues

National Deputy Chairperson Jennifer Story said that the Student Discount Coordinator contract position was filled a couple of weeks ago by Jeff Hsu, a member from Local 1. She said that he coordinated the Studentsaver Card last year. She said that the National Executive decided not to solicit different national discounts for the Studentsaver Card for the 1998-99 Card but chose to promote the International Student Identity Card, the Federation's ownership of Travel CUTS and the Studentsaver Card as the Federation membership card. She said that the Campaigns Coordinator is on a leave of absence and the National Executive will be deciding if the position should be filled. She said that two empty offices within the National office were offered to the East Timor Alert Network (ETAN) which is in keeping with the membership's will to support the campaign calling for the entancipation of East Timor.

# National Student Health Network (NSHN)

Lavigne said that there are two new health pans within the network. He said that Ryerson Students' Administrative Council, Local 24, and the University of Winnipeg Student Association, Local 8, are now members of the plan. He said that the broker, Canadian Actuarial and Consulting Group has merged with another to form a new group called Heath Insurance. He said that this will not have an impact on the plans but will assist with the administration of plans in British Columbia and Manitoba.

## **Communications Issues**

Lavigne said that the Federation has continued to receive high profile in both the commercial and campus media. He said that the National Day of Action received a tremendous amount of coverage. He said that this was important because and highlighting the student debt crisis and the Federation's demand for a national system of grants is only effective if those outside the post-secondary education system , understand the issues.

### **Membership Development**

Lavigne said that a significant amount of the Federation's resources are devoted to maintaining and increasing membership in the organisation. He said that Concordia Students' Union is the first large institute to join the Federation in a number of years and it indicates the Federation's growing presence in Québec and the need for Québec students to work in solidarity with students across Canada. He that in 1993 there were no members of the Federation in Québec and now there are over 22 000. He said that Québec student associations have not participated in pan-Canadian actions since 1963. He said that 30 years later the Post-Graduate Students' Society of McGill University joined the Federation and one year later the Concordia Graduate Students' Union joined. He said that in 1995 following the National Day of Strike and Action the undergraduate students at Concordia indicated an interest in joining the Federation.

Lavigne said that in 1992 the Douglas College Student Society, which is a multi-campus college, deemed themselves non-members. He said that the Federation chose not to recognise the referendum which was flawed and illegal. He said that in February the leadership of the society asked the membership if they wished to de-federate. He said that 85% of the membership voted to maintain membership in the Federation. He said that it is very exciting to have Douglas College Student Society participating fully in the Federation once again.

Lavigne said that the Students' Association of George Brown College represents the first large college within Ontario's extensive college system to join the Federation. He said that this ends the false distinction between universities and colleges unlike the situation in British Columbia and Newfoundland. He said that in British Columbia the universities and colleges have a history of working closely together which Ontario has not had until this time. He said that over 70% of the students who participated in the referendum voted in favour of membership. He said that this will effectively end the isolation that colleges and universities have experienced from one another. He said that as the cuts to post-secondary education take hold, as tuition fees increase in most of the country student associations who have avoided fighting back are recognising that it is vital that they participate in fighting the cuts. He said that the membership development report illustrates that student unions are joining together to work against the attack on post-secondary education in Canada.

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#### **Finances**

National Treasurer Christie Stephenson said that the amalgamation of the two legal entities, Canadian Federation of Students and Canadian Federation of Students-Services, is ongoing. She said that approximately 50% of the Federation's revenue is derived from membership fees. She said that it is the major source of cash flow for the Federation because the other revenues come in at the end of the year. She said that the timely remittance of the dues ensures that the Federation does not accrue a high amount of interest on a line of credit. She said that collection of outstanding membership fees is underway. She said that this year the legal process to collect fees from the Cariboo College Student Society was completed and the Student Society remitted the outstanding dues. She said that dues to be recovered include: Carleton University Graduate Students' Association; Holland College Students' Union; Selkirk Student Society; and Northwest Community College Students' Association. She said that the task of calculating, collecting and reimbursing travel pool fees has been outstanding for awhile. She said that the process is underway and will be completed in the near future.

Stephenson said that at the November 1997 national general meeting there was a motion to investigate transferring the Federation's accounts to a credit union. She said that this has been investigate in the past due to the Federation's specific needs. She said that another investigation has been undertaken and the Ottawa-Carleton Educational Credit Union is capable of taking on the Federation's banking requirements. She said that hopefully the Federation will transfer banks this fiscal year. She said that a concern was raised regarding the corporate ethics of Anderson Consulting which is the sister company of the Federation's auditors. She said that the concerns were to be expressed to the company and an investigation into alternative auditors be undertaken. She said that information is available for members to review. She said that the decision to change auditors will be debated at the November 1998 national general meeting and the auditing of the Federation has been put out to tender to independent Ottawa firms. She said that it looks positive that the Federation will be able to use one of these firms.

### **Coalitions and International Relations**

Story said that the coalition roster is a fairly comprehensive list of the organisations that the Federation has worked with or in solidarity with to achieve the Federation's goals and to work in solidarity towards the goals of other groups. She said that the Federation has been committed to working in solidarity with other groups, on issues like the Multi-Lateral Agreement on Investment (MAI). She said that work on the MAI has been a truly grassroots movement across Canada. She said that provincial, regional, and national organisations are providing support for their members to oppose the agreement. She said that the Federation has been one of the most vocal and visible opponents of the agreement. She said that the Federation has been a leader in encouraging other European union nations to take a strong position against the MAI.

"Story said that the Federation has continued its work on the Alternative Federal Budget (AFB). She said that the National Executive report includes an outline of the post-secondary education information included in the budget and a summary of the overall objectives of the budget. She said that the Action Canada Network (ACN) is a network of social justice, labour groups from across the country and regional coalitions. She said that it has historically been the organisation that, at the pan-Canadian level, that has been most vocal in opposition against free trade. She said that the Federation has a seat on the Executive of the Network.

Story said that the International Union of Students is in a dire financial position. She said that Carlyle has been assisting the International Union of Students with their efforts to rebuild the organisation and to stabilise it. She said that the Executive Secretatiat is currently considering bids to host an International Union of Students congress this year. She said that if it is successful it will be a more formal network of international student unions then currently exists. She said that it will be really important in opposing the MAI. She said that the Federation is only one of two organisations that have paid membership dues in full which reflects on the poor financial situation of the International Union of Students.

Story said that the Federation participated in a press conference calling for Suharto's resignation and condemning the killing of Indonesian students. She said that it appears that the work was somewhat successful because Suharto has resigned.

Lavigne said that the first appendix contains directives which the National Executive undertook. He said that the second is a report on the activities of Travel CUTS.

#### b. Questions Period

Local 19 delegate Baines said that the directives to encourage the attendance of more students' of colour at national general meetings, to develop the anti-racism poster and to develop and distribute of the students' with disabilities questionnaire were not reported on in the National Executive report. She asked for an update on the status of the directives.

National Deputy Chairperson Story said that Cindy Henriques, the Students' of Colour representative, took responsibility for the first two directives but had not attended the past two National Executive meetings and had not reported on the status of the directives. She said that the directives should have been reassigned.

National Treasurer Stephenson said that she started working on the questionnaire but did not have the opportunity to complete it.

Local 19 delegate Baines asked why the students' of colour directives were not reassigned or why Henriques, was not replaced or other member of the constituency groups were not contacted.

National Chairperson Lavigne said that constituency groups are sub-groups of delegates at general meetings so it is impossible to contact members of the constituency group outside of national general meetings. He said that at every National Executive meeting the National Executive review the status of every directive. He said that Henriques reported on the status of the directives at two National Executive meetings. He said that it is unconventional to attempt to find delegates from the previous national general meeting to determine a new course of action, like replacing the National Executive representative. He said that a mechanism to replace absent National Executive members should be developed and implemented but the National Executive does not currently have the authority to do so.

Local 68 delegate Michael Erikson asked if a mechanism is in place to ensure that the directive is fulfilled without referring them to the constituency group were they originated.

Story said that other directives have been fulfilled and were not assigned to National Executive members from the constituency group. She said that a member of the National Executive volunteered to take on this work and the National Executive assumed that she would continue to work on them even though she did not attend the National Executive meetings. She said that it was not possible to fulfil the directive due to time constraints not because constituency group directives are marginalised.

Local 68 delegate Dawn Pallin asked what financial compensation is received through the health plan. She said that the financial compensation has been fluctuating over the last couple of years. She said that Local 68 is in the midst of renegotiating the premiums and it appears that they will have to increase. She asked if the plan is operated on a not-for profit basis.

Lavigne said that member locals who are members of the health plan use the National Student Health Network for advocacy to ensure that they are receiving the best deal from the insurance company and the broker. He said that this advocacy, the National Student Health Network, costs money to operate. He said that in 1995 the Federation changed brokers and at the time the plan was costing the Federation money because it was investing money into the plan. He said that there is a commission realised by the broker, this commission fluctuates with each local. He said that the Federation is compensated for the work that it undertakes, the promotion of the plan, the advocacy work, materials, running health plan referenda. He said that the Federation is not the broker but an advocate. He said that the membership decided to operate the plan on a revenue neutral basis. He said that by the year 1999 or 2000 the Federation will have recouped all of its costs and the plan will be revenue neutral.

Local 75 delegate Chris Green asked why the report does not include information about the support cuts and the proposed elimination of the vocational rehabilitation services act. He asked why a campaign was not conducted on these issues. He said that the elimination is to be completed by August and approximately 10% of the student population is disabled. He said that Local 75 proposed a motion to develop a questionnaire to address this issue. He asked why this directive was not completed and what work would be conducted in the future to address these issues.

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Stephenson said that she was responsible for this directive. She said that she was unable to meet with the Students' with Disabilities commissioner until the November 1997 national general meeting. She said that it was her understanding that the questionnaire was to survey student associations about the level of support and types of services available for students' with disabilities. She said that she drafted a questionnaire in conjunction with the McGill Resource Centre for Students' with Disabilities. She said that National Executive considered the questionnaire but it was decided that more information should be gathered before it was distributed.

Local 54 delegate Dorter asked if the National Executive is committed to developing an anti-oppression analysis within the organisation so the Federation can play a leadership role in society.

Temelini said that the term anti-oppression has a much more complex meaning than the way it is being used. He said that there is an assumption that the term anti-oppression is an unambiguous term which is understood universally. He said that the language is elitist and alienating and it should not be used. He said that instead members should be addressing the Federation's work on specific issues. He said that the delegates at general meetings represent a wide cross section of university and college campuses. He said that the National Executive is not solely committed to anti-oppression work because it is a reflection of the membership's priorities. He said that the National Executive is completely committed to working against homophobia, sexism, ableism, classism, racism as are the members of the Federation.

Local 54 delegate Dorter asked if the National Executive will acknowledge that this type of oppression is present within the governing structures of the organisation and be willing to hold a workshop to address these issues.

Lavigne said that the National Executive is always accountable to the membership. He said that it is the duty of the National Executive to coordinate the work and therefore fulfill the will of the membership between national general meetings. He said that the National Executive does not question the desires of the membership but implements the decisions. He said that the Federation recognises the imbalances because the membership has developed policies and has implemented various campaigns to address those imbalances.

Local 33 delegate Battie thanked the National Executive for their efforts on behalf of a student at Local 33. She said that the National Executive made a decision to provide money to a legal case initiated by a student who was being harassed by an instructor. She said that the student won the case and it would not have been possible without the support of the Federation and it is a testament to the National Executive's committment to anti-oppression work. She said that the members at the local level have seen the committment from the Federation in a concrete form.

Saskatchewan Component executive member Peart asked if members of the National Executive believed that the workshop held on Friday, May 22 was an anti-oppression workshop.

"Story said that the National Executive discussed the workshop, decided that it would focus on the MAI and developed a list of potential speakers. She said that it was an extension of the workshop held at the November 1997 national general meeting which focussed on the MAI. She said that the National Executive believed that it was an anti-oppression workshop. She said that a couple of the original speakers were unable to attend the workshop but they would have broadened the focus of the workshop and addressed some of the concerns people were expressing.

Local 9 delegate Hakizamana asked why the National Executive had a member of the National Executive attend the Student's of Colour attend the constituency group although the individual was not a member of the constituency group.

Story said that it is occasionally the case that a National Executive member will resource a group she is not a member of. She said that it is important that the members of the group have access to the information or perspectives of the National Executive.

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Local 9 delegate Clarke said that she believes that expanding into the United States and thus taking advantage of the North American Free Trade Agreement, actually constituted support for the Agreement. She added that the President of Travel CUTS should not conduct this investigation because he has an obvious bias.

Local 18 delegate McEvoy said that it was not the President of Travel CUTS who made the decision but the Travel CUTS Board. He said that the issue has already been investigated and there is no information which is pertinent to plenary's decision. He said that the Travel CUTS board made an informed decision and the Organisational Development Committee members made an informed decision.

#### 98/05:175 **DEFEATED**

Local 19 delegate Baines said that there is a philosophical difference about the implications of expansion into the United States amongst the membership. She said that operating under the open skies policy is tacit agreement with the NAFTA agreement. She said that the Federation does not support Free Trade and the rationale that the Federation must participate and take advantage of the open skies policy is flawed. She said that part of the reason that Travel CUTS was created was because it was deemed an essential service for students. She said that airfares are no longer incredibly high and Travel CUTS is no longer offering a service which is not offered anywhere else.

Local 61 delegate Steve Beasley said that there is a misconception that Travel CUTS is an evil corporation that was developed to make money from students. He said that upon examination of globalisation and the impact it has had on corporations members will realise that Travel CUTS is a glaring exception to the rule. He said that the company has given \$900 000 to the budget of a social justice organisation to use in campaigns to defeat regressive policies. He said that expansion into the United States is an attempt to ensure that Travel CUTS will be a viable entity. He said that it is important to ensure that Travel CUTS continues to offer discounts and provide a legitimate service to students.

Local 44 delegate Linda Szasz said that it is hypocritical to specify the offices in the United States as opposed to the offices in England. She said that Travel CUTS provides an important service to members and it is an important membership development tool. She said that many international students are forced to travel and appreciate this information and service. She said that the motion is unclear, inconsistent and it jeopardises the organisation.

Local 54 delegate Keefer said that there are some members who do not have access to Travel CUTS because it is not profitable but the company is expanding into the United States. He said that the Federation is not expanding in Canada which is where the membership of the Federation is based. He said that the Federation does not support travel to nations with poor human rights records yet the company has expanded into a country that has some of the most abysmal human rights in the world. He said that the Federation is in this business to support the membership and therefore Travel CUTS should not be expanding into England either.

National Chairperson Lavigne said that a number of new offices have opened in Canada. He said that member locals will occasionally request a Travei CUTS office on campus. He said that the only request forwarded to the board is from Lakehead University Students' Union, Local 32. He said that the Travel CUTS board will deliberate on this request at the summer Travel CUTS meeting.

Local 18 delegate McEvoy said that he is opposed to NAFTA but he is not opposed to the desire of some students from California to travel to Canada on discount fares. He said that there is no violation of policy. He said that the board made the decision, as is the practice. He said that the representatives who were elected by the membership sit on the board and make these types of decisions in the structure that the membership adopted. He said that nothing incorrect was done. He said that the growth of competitive, large U.S student travel companies initiated this decision. He said that this would have occurred with or without NAFTA. He said that a huge portion of the international travel sales is to the United States, He said that the United States is the obvious place for expansion. He said that there is no negative effect on the environment because Travel CUTS has expanded into the U.S, nor is there a negative effect on human rights in the U.S. He said that no Federation policy is being contradicted. He said that it is progressive for an organisation which are social movements to develop both political and economic power. He said that it damages the Federation if the campaigns have to be reduced or the membership fees increased because the circumstances were not responded to appropriately. He said that if Travel CUTS were a different type of asset the membership would take responsible steps to insure it. He said that the expansion into the United States insures the well being of the company. He said that there should not be a double standard between the local operations and the national operations.

Québec Component Coordinator Benoît Renaud said that the Québec Component deliberated on this motion and is in favour of it because it is more specific than the current policy.

Local 86 delegate Angela Mercer said that she was opposed to the motion. She said that the Aboriginal Caucus has never reached consensus on the motion and will not likely reach consensus. She said that it should be recognised that Québec has oppressed First Nations people.

Local 18 delegate Jaimie McEvoy said that the discussion was initiated arose because of the Oka Crisis and there was some level of conflict between some members in the Aboriginal Caucus and some members of the Francophone Constituency group who were sympathetic to Québec. He said that it was a long and unconstructive debate. He said that it was resolved that a resolution should be developed to accommodate the desire of Aboriginal people and people living in Québec to have the right to self determination. He said that one must prevail. He said that it is unclear who should prevail and it is unclear if the Federation should actually take a position on this issue. He said that the proposed policy does not address a number of different scenarios.

Local 75 delegate Troy Sebastian said that consensus cannot be found on this issue. He said that the Federation is not at a point where it can come to agreement on the issue.

Local 44 delegate Anna Hudson said that she is strongly in favour of the motion. She said that she has experienced both oppression and colonisation and she will not rank the two. She said that the Federation should stand in solidarity with people who wish to decide upon their future. She said that to disagree is to support colonisation. She said that the Federation has supported Aboriginal people and she is prepared to stand in solidarity with other members of the Federation.

National Aboriginal Representative Kerrigan said that there is no consensus about this motion. She said that there are a number of delegates who do not wish to speak to the motion because they are uncomfortable speaking on plenary floor. She said that valuable time in the Aboriginal Caucus was spent debating this issue. She said that the motion should be postponed to the next national general meeting so it can be further considered.

Local 92 delegate Jerome Adamo said that delegates should consider the views of the Aboriginal Caucus. He said that he has not had a great deal of exposure to First Nations Peoples issues and he has a great deal to learn. He said that there is a high number of Aboriginal students at George Brown College.

A guest from Local 89 said that Aboriginal people are very diverse, as is the Federation. She said that not everyone will agree on every issue. She said that not recognising the oppression of other individuals will perpetuate the oppression. She said that anyone who has been oppressed should be given a choice to determine the future, including people in Québec and Aboriginal people.

Local 18 McEvoy delegate said that the discussion is disrespectful of the actual policy. He said that it is the right of oppressed people to meet together and to determine a course of action. He said that it is the right of the Aboriginal caucus to develop a position on this issue which they have not done. He said that there should be a direct discussion between representatives of the Aboriginal Caucus and the Québec Component and the membership should follow that lead.

# e. Proposal to Modify Policy on Sexual Orientation

### 97/11:056 MOTION TO AMEND POLICY

Local 5/Local 84

Be it resolved that the policy on Sexual Orientation be amended to read as follows:

## Preamble

The Federation shall, from time to time, in support of this policy, engage in various campaigns to work for equality for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered students.

# Discrimination

The Federation supports the inclusion of sexual orientation as prohibited grounds for discrimination in organisations, businesses, and governments; and in all areas of academic life. The Federation therefore:

- opposes discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered faculty, including denial of tenure on the basis of sexual orientation;
- 2. urges post-secondary institution administrations to work with lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered students, faculty and staff to provide anti-homophobia workshops
- 3. recognises March 14th as a Day Without Hate.

## **Declaration of Student Rights:**

### Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgendered Students

The Federation declares that all lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered students have the right to:

- 1. live freely and openly as full and equal participants in society;
- 2. equal access to, equal treatment in, and freedom from harassment in all aspects of post-secondary education, employment, provision of public services, and housing;
- organise on campus, regardless of sexual orientation, in a manner consistent with self-determined
  principles as opposed to externally imposed principles, and with equal access to funding, space, facilities
  and resources on campuses;

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- access to programs and curricula dealing with, and including fair and honest treatment of, lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered content, such as history, sociology, culture, sexuality, psychology, politics, and legal status;
- 5. organisation, celebration and observation of Pink Triangle Day every February 14th, International Pride Day, and any other events which promote a sense of identity and community;
- 6. access to resources which assist in the healthy development of a positive individual, community, and societal self-image, including professional services provided by lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered professionals, or professionals specialising in the provision of services to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered clients, in a receptive and positive environment;
- 7. legal recognition including, but not limited to, legal recognition of same sex relationships including marriage and its associated benefits in the eyes of the law and society, including custody or adoption of children on an equal basis with heterosexual people.

#### Homophobia

The Federation opposes homophobic violence, which it recognises as a hate crime. Homophobia creates a climate which fosters homophobic violence, compounded and intensified in the case of people of colour, people with disabilities, Aboriginal people, and other traditionally and historically marginalised people. Homophobia its therefore creates an environment on campuses which presents a barrier to access.

- 2. urges post-secondary institution administrations to work with lesbian, gay, bisexual, two-spirited and transgendered students, faculty and staff to provide workshops dealing with unlearning and eliminating transphobia, biphobia, lesbophobia, homophobia, and heterosexism; and
- supports an ongoing commitment to anti-oppression campaigns specific to lesbian, gay, bisexual, twospirited, and transgendered people, including but not limited to 'Days Against Hate."

### **Declaration of Student Rights:**

## Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two-spirited and Transgendered Students

The Federation declares that all lesbian, gay, bisexual, two-spirited and transgendered students have the right to:

- 1. live freely and openly as full and equal participants in society;
- equal access to, equal treatment in, and freedom from harassment in all aspects of post-secondary education, employment, provision of public services, and housing:
- organise on campus, regardless of sexual orientation, in a manner consistent with self-determined
  principles as opposed to externally imposed principles, and with equal access to funding, space, facilities

The Federation believes an accessible education system is one which is open to all applicants who desire to attend a post-secondary institution. An accessible education should allow the individual student to choose the education of her choice. In addition, the Federation supports the elimination of all financial barriers to post-secondary education (refer to Issues Policy: Accessibility). Post-secondary institutions levy up-front user fees to subsidise operating costs. The Federation fervently opposes any proposals which advocate for tuition fees as a solution to the problem of under-funding. Systemic under-funding has increased the financial burden sustained by students in post-secondary institutions through up-front user fees.

The Federation believes that the government must consider the realistic costs of post-secondary education above and beyond tuition fees and ancillary fees. Furthermore, the Federation believes that student aid line item levels should be adjusted annually to reflect the costs associated with the attainment of a post-secondary education, and that this adjustment should reflect regional differences in the cost of obtaining a post-secondary education (refer to Issues Policy: Student Aid).

Need is defined as circumstances requiring some course of action in times of difficulty or crisis, often described as destitution or poverty in extreme circumstances. The Federation recognises there are varying financial requirements between students pursuing studies in colleges/technical institutes, undergraduate programs, and graduate programs. The Federation also recognises the unique financial needs of students with disabilities and international students. Therefore the Federation recognises that it is essential to identify various parameters in determining the financial needs of these different groups.

The following criteria should be included in any assessment of need:

## Living Expenses:

- rent/mortgage
- car/transportation
- monthly bills
- food/household/hygiene
- trips home
- clothing
- moving costs

### Post-secondary Education:

- up-front user fees (tuition, ancillary, etc.)
- books/program supplies/equipment

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- currently held scholarships, stipends, research granting council funding

- thesis production costs
- academic subscriptions

- income
- assets

#### Debt:
